Ben Freiceadain: Orkney-Cromarty Round Cairn with (?) Camster-type chamber. This cairn is situated within the fort HND 05 NE 018 which crowns the summit, towards its W The mound is grass-grown; the top has been reduced so that it now stands about 6 ft high, and the 3 side has 6ft = 1.83mbeen severely robbed. The diameter is 55 ft and the edge 55ft = 16.88mis quite distinct. The entrance has been from the ENE. 


With fieldglasses it is possible to see at least seventeen chambered cairns from this site.
