This chambered cairn has been considerably robbed and now appears as an irregular, turf-covered mound about 6 ft high from which the tops of some stones project. Its extent, however, is quite clear, 75 ft N-S by 70 ft transversely. The entrance to the chamber has been from the SSE and the remains, as visible at present, suggest a passage 20 ft long with a large chamber 26 ft long divided into only three compartments, 9 ft 10 ft and 6 ft long respectively." 
373. Chambered Cairn, Loch Calder.—On the W. side of Loch Calder, about \(\frac{1}{4}\) m. from the S. end of the loch, and about \(\frac{1}{4}\) m. NNW. of Carriside, is a chambered cairn. The diameter over all is 70' and the greatest elevation is 6'. The entrance has been from the ESE, and some 18' from the outer edge in that direction two thin slabs, 2' 9" apart, protrude from the turf with which the cairn is overgrown, while in front of them lies a stone which has evidently formed a lintel. In rear of these stones several other parallel slabs protrude, indicating the divisions of the chamber and of the back. The slab occupying the latter position is 5' broad. None of the slabs extend above ground for a greater height than 1' 7". No parts of the walls of the chamber are visible. A large amount of stone has evidently at some time been removed from the cairn on the SE.



Description. The cairn is situated on the gentle moorland slope down to the shore of the loch, at a little over 250ft. OD. It has been considerably robbed and now appears as an irregular turf-covered mound about 6ft, high, from which the tops of some stones project. Its extent is, however, quite clear, 75ft. N-S and 70ft. E-W.

The entrance to the chamber has been from the SSE. At 16ft. from the cairn edge on this side there lies a lintel stone, probably in situ over the inner end of the passage. Behind it is a pair of transverse slabs 2ft. 9in. apart. Nine feet further N there is a single transverse slab on the E side of the chamber. At a further 10ft. to the N is another pair of transverse slabs set 3ft. 6in. apart, with a back slab 6ft. behind them and a slab forming part of the wall of this inner compartment. The back-slab is the tallest in the chamber, the other stones graduating in height though there is no great difference between them. The remains, as visible at present, suggest a passage 10ft. or more long with a large chamber 26ft. long divided into only three compartments, 9ft., 10ft. and 6ft. long respectively.
