This monument is in terribly ruined condition as not only is it the focus of a present day garden and farmyard, but its southern flanks have been heavily damaged by the construction, in the nineteenth century, of Shurrery Church. It is clearly, however, a monument of great interest. The cairn even in its ruined condition is 35m in width by 50m in length. Such a cairn is large even in its truncated condition by Caithness standards. Six slabs were noted during the 1982 survey exposed by robbing on the E side of the cairn and these would appear as both Curle (1911) and Henshall (1963) have said to relate to a stalled cairn at least 13m in length - such a chamber would also be unique in Caithness. The monument is situated in relatively low lying and fertile land c.1 km SE of the deserted village of Broubster.

291. Chambered cairn. 'Shurrery Church'. Dimensions: 40m x 24m. Height: 4m. Subrectangular grass-covered mound. Orientation: N-S. The cairn is cut by two walls. On the E side of the cairn six parallel upright stones are visible, with three more with a similar alignment running down the centre of the cairn. These are presumably the remains of stalls. The drystone construction at the N end of the cairn has been exposed, and much damage has occurred around its perimeter. Elevation: 300' OD.



Description. Between the church at Shurrery and the croft to the NE, at 300ft. OD, lie the remains of a curious and much mutilated site. It appears to have been a large cairn built on a knoll; it is now mainly grass-grown and stands to a maximum height of about 6ft. The present length NNE-SSW is about 115ft., but the cairn may have been curtailed at the s end; the width is about 120ft. but the edge is difficult to define and merges into the slope of the knoll. The cairn is crossed by two walls. The s end is now within the enclosure round the church, and is reduced to a barely perceptible rise and the edge is vague. The area between the walls is covered with rough turf and the tops of various stones protrude. A small square building has been built against the E side. The N end of the cairn lies partly in a croft garden and partly in a field. Here it has been greatly reduced round the edges and faced with a retaining wall, while field stones have been added to the top, the resulting construction having almost vertical sides 4 to 5ft. high and a flat

A row of parallel slabs, set on end and aligned on the NNE-SSW axis but set transversely to it, can be seen a little to the E of the apparent centre of the cairn. The northernmost stone is 19ft. from the present N end, and the eight stones (one of them fallen) are spaced over a distance of 40ft. The two stones (one of them fallen) are spaced over a distance of 40ft. The two southernmost of these stones are in the less disturbed part of the cairn between the walls with their tops only just visible, over 14ft. apart. Another stone lies under the wall. The stones to the N are spaced 4 to 5ft. apart and are joined by built walling 4 to 5ft. high. This, certainly older than the croft garden wall, may possibly be partly original; a modern retaining wall continuing northwards hides all but the tip of the northernmost stone and continues to the N built with a marked batter inwards against the cairn. The ground slopes down from the upright stones to the E. The stones are exposed

for their full height, 5ft., 4ft. 6in., 4ft. and 4ft. respectively from N-S.

Eleven feet to the w of the fallen stone in the row just described, and parallel to it, there projects the top of another stone. To the sw is a second stone also parallel, just showing through the turf.

Although the site is extremely disturbed the remains do seem to indicate

a cairn with a long stalled chamber, as first suggested by Curle.

(ND 0488 5874) Cairn (NR) (1)The mutilated remains of this round cairn measure about 35.0 m in diameter by 2.1 m high. To the S of each of the walls which cross it, the cairn survives as a grass-covered mound. N of the northern wall, more details can be seen. The main body of the cairn is within a retaining wall, and in the Ξ five slabs are set on edge forming four The original perimeter of the cairn cannot be stalls. traced.

The chambered cairn is as described and planned by the previous authorities. A very low spread of rubble E of the chamber appears to be cairn material. (OSFI: JB: 21.7.1981.)
