The entrance has been from the SSE, the outer end probably being marked by a small slab 10ft (3.0m) within the apparent cairn edge. The outer chamber was 5ft(1.5m) long, the centre one about 9ft(2.7m) by 7ft(2.1m); nothing remains of th inner chamber."(2)(3)



Description. The site is on a slight knoll in a field above the Burn of Houstry, at a little over 300ft. OD. The cairn has been almost entirely removed, but the edge can be traced in the sw quadrant and suggests an original diameter of 60 to 70ft. Six large upright slabs indicate the position and plan of the chamber.

The entrance has been from the SSE side; the outer end of the passage is probably marked by a small slab 10 ft, within the apparent cairn edge. The length of the passage has been about 9 ft. 6 in. It entered the outer compartment of the chamber between portal stones 2 ft, apart. This compartment was 5 ft. long, and divided from the central compartment by another pair of stones, the western of which is 4 ft. high, considerably taller than the other slabs. A stone, probably the w partner of a second pair of divisional slabs, stands at the end of the compartment and another stone forms part of the w wall; the compartment has measured about 9 ft. by about 7 ft. Nothing remains of an inner compartment.
