## 52 TEXT

"NH 6833 3515. On the hillock in the trees midway between Gask burn and cross roads is a burial, and perhaps the road went through one." (OSFI:DT:28.2.1962) "NH 6838 3516. No trace of any burial was noticed on this hillock. At the E edge of the hillock there is a circular hollow c.6.0m. in diameter by c.1.0m deep with some large stones on its W edge but it suggests surface quarrying rather than a 'burial' or cairn. The road cuts through the W end of the hillock and there are several large boulders scattered along both sides of the cuttings, but these are probably the remains of a boulder wall which formerly bounded either side of the road. On the other side of the road there are stone clearance heaps in the clumps of trees." (OSFIWDJ:4.9.1963)
