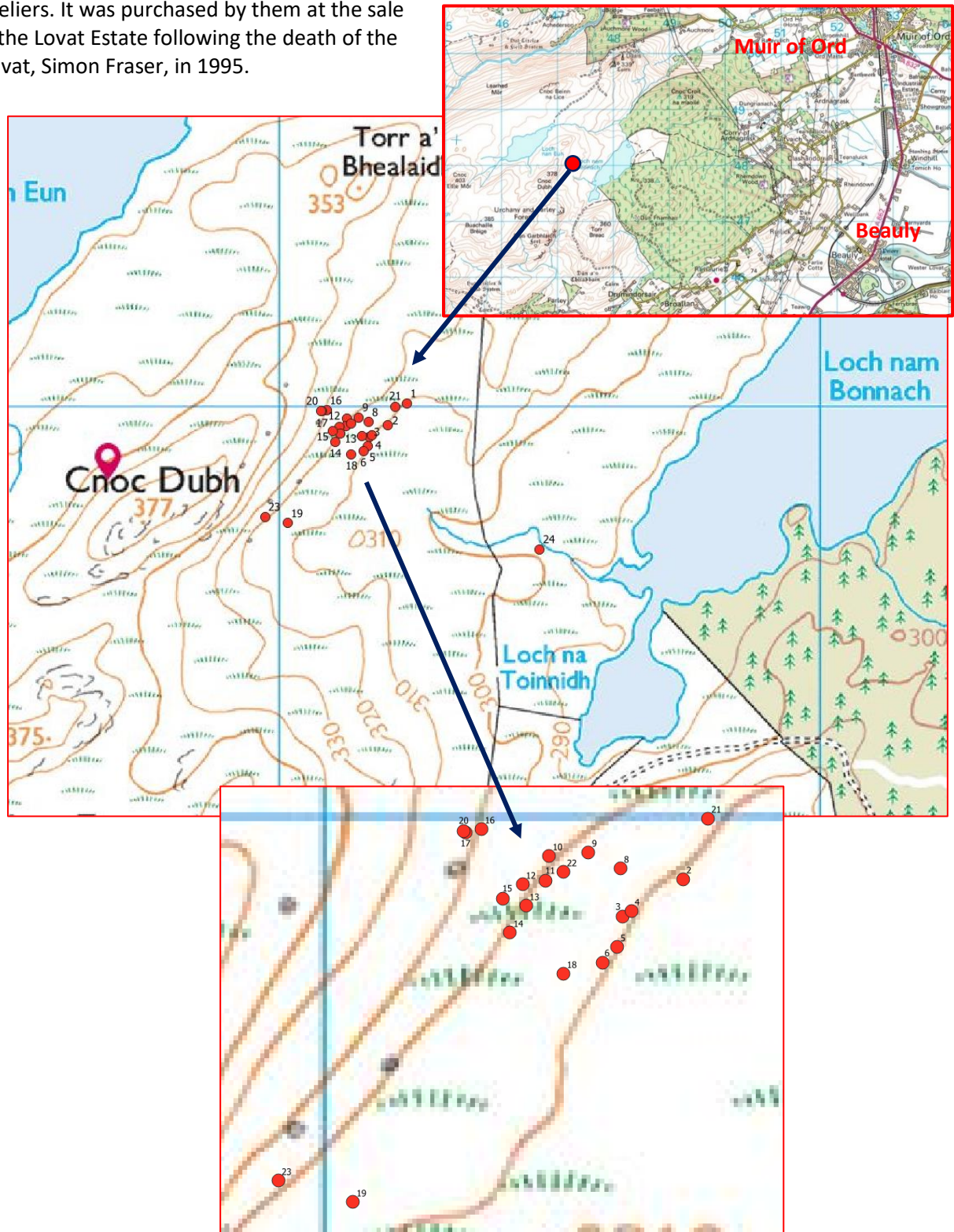


Loch nam Bonnach Shieling Site

Background

In March 2021 a NOSAS member was walking on the NW side of Loch nam Bonnach on the moors above Beauly, west of Inverness. He identified some platforms on the SE-facing slope of a low ridge and thought they could be shieling platforms. This was subsequently confirmed by further visits to the site by other NOSAS members.

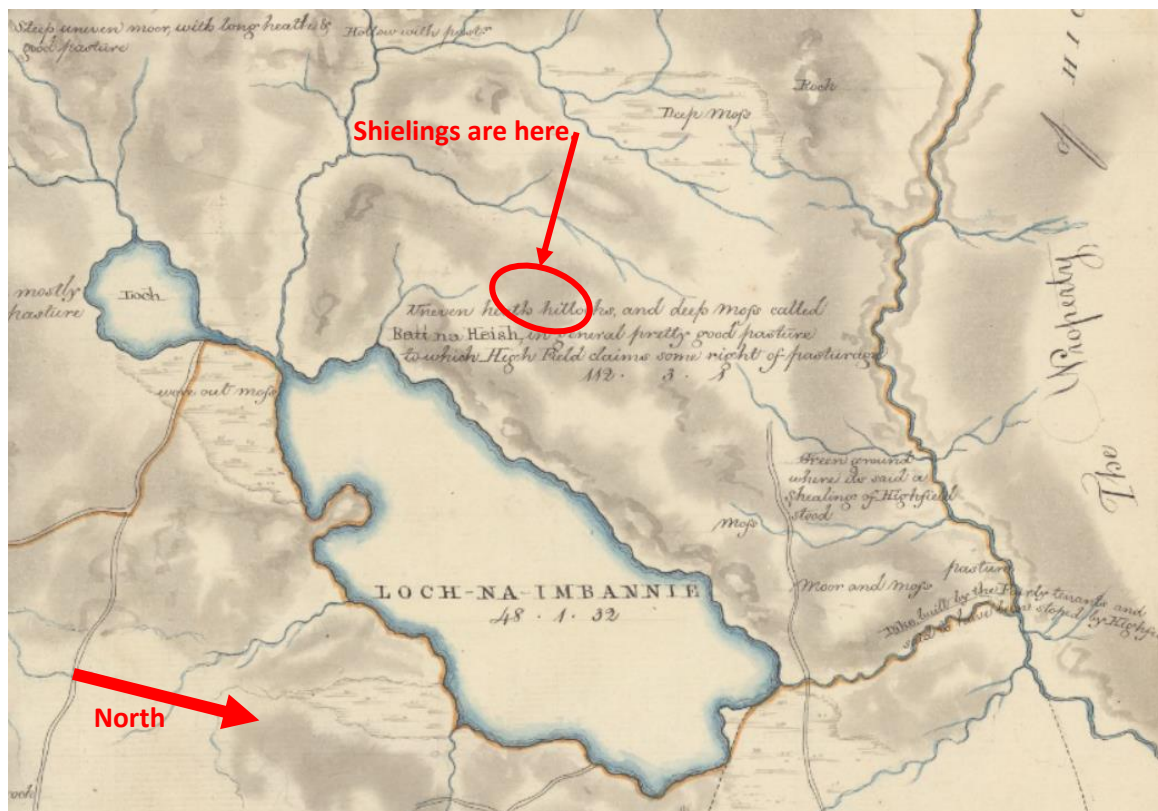
Although Loch nam Bonnach is frequently visited by walkers from Beauly and Muir of Ord, this is usually to the eastern or northern shores. The NW side is less frequented, although there is a track westwards from the N end to the even more remote Loch nan Eun. The land, part of the Farley Estate, currently belongs to the Walduck family, London hoteliers. It was purchased by them at the sale of much of the Lovat Estate following the death of the 15th Lord Lovat, Simon Fraser, in 1995.



The Shieling Site on Maps

Lovat Estate maps from 1800 onwards include the land on which the shielings lie as being within the estate boundaries. At that time the area was called *Bad na Heish*.

1800 Estate Map surveyed and drawn by George Brown



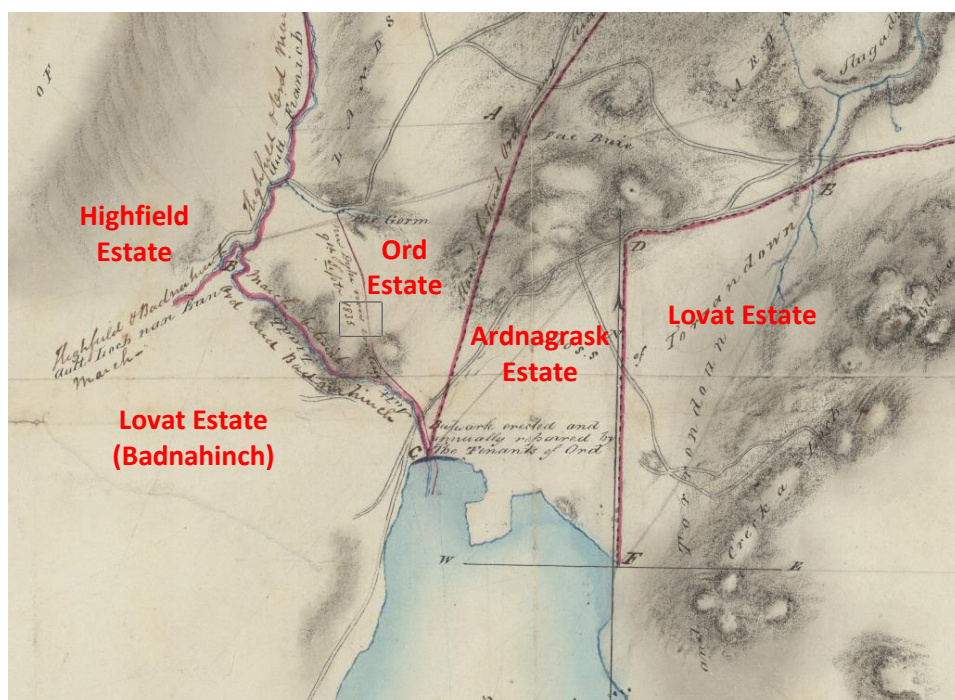
The shieling site is indicated. Note that N is towards the bottom right. The handwritten text below it says: “Uneven heath hillocks and deep moss called *Bad na Heish* in general pretty good pasture to which Highfield (Estate) claims some right of pasturage”. There is further text written just north (ie below) of it “Green ground where it is said a shealing of Highfield stood”.

This map details the complicated estate boundaries at the north end of Loch nam Bonnach, as shown.

- Highfield – George Gillanders
- Ord - Thomas Mackenzie
- Ardnagrask – Thomas Mackenzie
- Lovat – Thomas Fraser

On an estate map of 1852 the land is called “Farley Hill Ground”. The Ordnance Survey maps – 1st edition 1872, 2nd edition 1902 – show this area as featureless.



Description of the Site

NW of the lower end of Loch nam Bonnach is a low ridge at 300m asl, running SW-NE. Parallel to this and rising to the peak of Cnoc Dubh at 377m at the SW end is another higher SW-NE ridge. Between the two is a shallow bowl of lower green ground, through which an un-named small burn flows to the SE to drain into Loch nam Bonnach. On the lower slopes of the higher ridge, facing to the SE, are a variety of structures.

A total of 20 structures on this slope were identified and then surveyed and photographed on 19th May 2021. They are described in detail in the table on pages 4-5 . In summary they are:

- 13 platforms, probably shieling huts (*Structures 2, 4-13, 18,23*)
- 1 circular stone structure, probably a roundhouse (*Structure 3*)
- 3 small circular structures, possibly dairies (*Structures 16, 21, 22*)
- 2 stone- defined platforms of indeterminate function (*Structures 17, 19*)
- 1 stone-defined pit, possibly a lambing pen (*Structure 14*)

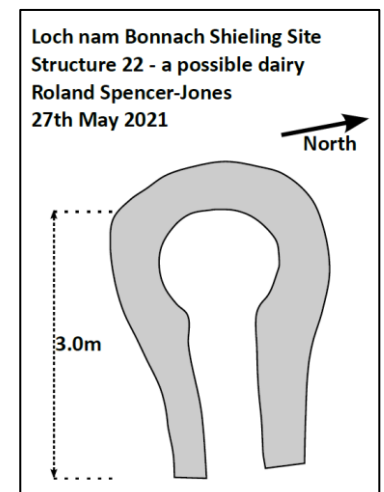
The thirteen platforms were set out from the slope often with a recess into the bank on the uphill side and buttressing on the downhill side. They tended to be rectangular or sub-rectangular, orientated SW-NE, constructed of turf with, or occasionally without, a stone base. Entrances were rarely identifiable as the walls were invariably eroded and insubstantial, usually 0.2 - 0.6m high, suggesting that these structures are quite old. Expert opinion on site suggested >200years old. The main identifiable features were the platforms jutting out from the slope.

In the centre of the group of rectangular or sub-rectangular structures is one round structure, Structure 3, with stone walls comprised of massive stones. The 1.3m wide walls currently stand to 0.6m, highest in the west. There is a probable entrance in the east, although upslope in the west there is also a break in the stones, possibly caused by tumble and/or animal damage. This may represent a pre-historic hut circle dwelling. Just outside this structure, to the SE, is a flat platform on which stands the remains of an oval building (Structure 4), with 1m walls up to 0.5m high. It is not clear whether these two structures are contemporaneous. Or, if Structure 3 is pre-historic, Structure 4 could be a later shieling.

Amongst the shieling huts are three rounded scoops built into the slope, with an elongated entrance or channel downslope. A dimensioned sketch of one of these, Structure 22, can be seen to the right. The walls are of stone, up to 0.5m high, 0.5m thick. These relatively small structures could not have been dwellings. They could possibly be lambing pens, or more likely dairies in which butter and cheese were made or stored.

Two of the platforms (Structures 17 & 19) had traces of stones on them, which could be the remains of shielings or could possibly just be natural platforms in the slope with tumbled stone. Lastly, Structure 14, is a small circular ring of large stones, 1.0m x 0.8m, with walls 0.8m thick and up to 0.25m high. The centre seemed lower than the surrounding ground. There was no entrance to this structure, which could represent a lambing pen.

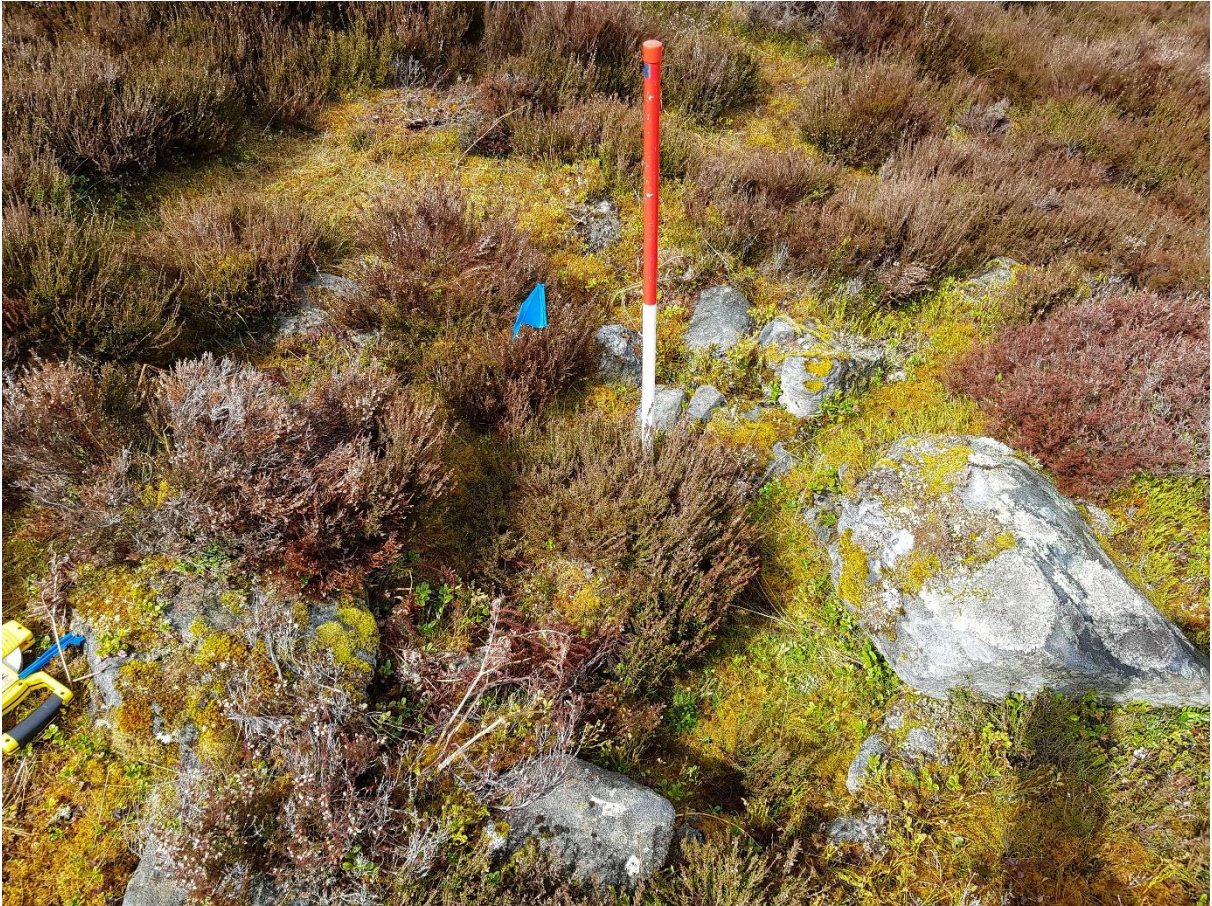
