SMR, Highbridge Farm, Spean Bridge

Please find a site visit record sheet enclosed with maps and photos for Highbridge Farm near to Spean Bridge. By way of explanation, I was allowed out of my cage last autumn to look at a matter involving a planning consent condition to provide off road dog walking facilities!

NOSWA are soon to go ahead with a big new water supply system for Fort William, by abstraction from the gravels in the Great Glen at Camisky. They have planning consent now to use the very narrow Brackletter road which goes through Highbridge, and one particular local resident who operates kennels, made enough fuss for a planning condition to be attached for the provision of dog walking facilities as an alternative to using what is normally a very quiet country road.

I met an engineer from Messrs Mott Macdonald, NOSWA's consulting engineers for the project, and looked at footpath creation options in the area. In so doing I ended up learning that Highland Council owns Highbridge Farm, highlighted pink on Map No 1 enclosed. The former Lochaber District Council some years ago bought Achnabobin and Highbridge Farms in order to acquire a site they wanted to develop for travelling people. The tenant at Achnabobin exercised a right to purchase soon after the old District Council had bought the property, the Council developed their new travellers site and for reasons unknown to me they held on to the land area which I am calling Highbridge Farm.

Things went quiet on the footpath matter, when out of the blue, the private refuse tip at Duisky which the Council was using was closed and in the emergency, Brackletter tip beside Highbridge was reopened as a waste transfer station. Suddenly this quiet wee road was busy again with lorries and this matter of dog exercising came up again. I was asked by the local Councillor to look at the problem in a hurry, and that is how I came to be walking over Highbridge Farm.

I could not avoid noticing the archaeology on the site, and I made some mental notes. My camera was out of action at the time, but I have just recently been back and taken the photos which I now enclose.

I may be completely out of order with my next saga, and if so please excuse my intervention. Just put it down to naïve enthusiasm!

At the time I was on site with the chap from Mott Macdonald, I learned that it was NOSWA's intention to cut the corner off at Highbridge with a temporary new road, as I have shown on Map No 2, and I believe they now have planning consent for this.

It took me a wee while to get my "eye in" at Highbridge, but I am now reasonably convinced that the Highland Council is the owner of some interesting archaeology there. This is probably all on record leaving me looking a right Charlie." Never mind, but I am a bit concerned that the proposed new diversion may be cutting through archaeology. Part of the area is masked under whin bushes, trees and rushes. There are definitely old earth dykes and ditches crossing the area in question, possibly a trackway, and possibly some platforms of which I am less than certain. The ground is rolling moraine humps with poorly drained hollows in between. The farm land has been derelict for many years, and I don't think it has ever seen modern machinery. There is some old horse drawn equipment laying out in the middle amongst the whin bushes.

The land is a tapestry of old fields bounded by earth dykes and ditches. The modern post and wire fencing is very dilapidated and sheep and cattle from a nearby farm seem to have a free run of the place.

The big raised platform at 19858170, and the large dry stone ruin at 19558170 which has a military feel to it, are worth a look if no one has already done so. My first reaction to the bend in Wade's road at Highbridge was that he was avoiding some very wet ground, but I now think he may have been going round a well laid out farm.

Please let me know if Highbridge Farm has been previously recorded, and whether you would like me to record anything in greater detail.

The question of the management of this land now and in the future has to be raised sometime with someone in the organisation who wants to listen. The building beside the lay-by for instance, which is supposed to be an old inn, is in a dangerous state and wide open to the public at the moment.



- 10. POSSIBLE PLATFORM OVERLOOKING THERIVER ON NORTH SIDE OF ROAD IN WOODLAND.












