Some 200m S of Loch a' Bhealaich on the S side of the Alltan Nighean Alisdair are the possible stone footings for a turf walled shieling c5m by c3m aligned WNW/ESE with stones protruding from the grass. A tiny stone walled structure c0.5m wide at the S widening to c1m wide at the N internally, with walls c0.6m wide and c0.2m high, is sited nearby to the W. About 7m to the E is a mound measuring c5m by c4m aligned more N/S. There are other mounds in the vicinity that may also once have been structures. These are too overgrown to be confirmed as 'real' features.

This is a small group of shielings. The feature to the W might have been used as a still site and perhaps even after the shieling was abandoned as it is the most prominent feature in the group.

To the W of the path recorded on the 1971 OS map and S of an unnamed burn are the turf capped footings c0.8m wide and c0.3m high of a structure c8m by c3m aligned N/S. Some 50m to the SE built against a large boulder c4-5m in diameter are the remains of a trapezoidal drystone structure c5m and c3m long by c4m wide. The irregular stone walls are up to 0.5m high and c0.7m wide.

The former structure was initially interpreted as a deer watcher's house as the grazing is not particularly good in this area. However no building was recorded here on the earlier OS maps. Nevertheless this structure is larger and more prominent than the shielings at Alltan Nighean Alasdair (KIN131).

On the N shore of Loch Gaorsaic are the remains of a building c3.5m wide by c5m long with walls c0.6m wide. The doorway, fronting the loch, is 1.8m wide by c1.8m high. The walls appear to have been made of poured concrete. The roof slopes from N to S from c2.5m high to c1.75m high. Former timbers from this building have been burnt.

A boathouse not recorded on the 1971 or 1st and 2nd OS maps. It is considered locally to have been abandoned before 1871. The cement was presumably brought in and mixed with locally available sand and gravel to reduce weight.

A group of 3 structures was noted here. The largest building is aligned NNE/SSW and measures c11m by c5m over stone walls c0.8m wide and surviving no more than c0.5m high. It is roundended. Traces of mortar render survive in places externally. A secondary chamber c3m long is at its E end. About 20m to the SE and built against a large natural knoll is a drystone building c8m by c4m over walls c0.7m wide and up to 1m high. Some 30m to the SE of this is a third building measuring c8.5m by c5m. The walls of this building are ill-defined as 3 secondary structures c1-1.5m diameter with walls c0.6m wide and c1m high have built out of its robbed walls. In front of this building are the remains of a patch of rig cultivation 14m E by 10m N/S. The rig measures 2m in width.

The main structure was probably built as a shepherd's house. The mortar render suggests it was occupied to a relatively late date. However it was shown as unroofed by 1874. The patch of rig suggests the shepherd was attempting to grow crops, probably potatoes, at this altitude (c400mOD).

The collapsed material within the building suggests the roof has fallen in. There is no sign of collapse externally. In the S gable is a window c0.5m high by c0.3m wide.

This is one of the best preserved structures in the area. It is presumed to be bothy or byre, of unknown purpose and possibly built after sheep were cleared from this area.

An irregular stone dyke c0.6m wide and c0.2m high forms an enclosure c11m long by c1-3m wide around this chamber. Though in a grassy flush potentially suitable for a shieling, no other buildings or structures were noted.

This was identified during the site visit as a probable shieling where the other buildings are overgrown or washed away. It is possible that this was the only structue at this site, in which case it is likely to be the remains of a still.

Just outwith the NTS Estate boundary and close to the head of the pass is a crude platform, c1.5m square, which has been constructed to the E of a huge boulder. Some sort of structure is recorded on the 1st edition OS map. The platform is enclosed by a low dyke c4m long that then runs S to the path. There is also a revetting stone feature that runs intermittently E/W beyond this site, as well as a low N/S dyke. The dyke lies 30m E of the ?platform and runs 10m S to the path before extending a further 20m before disappearing under a pile of scree.

On the basis of 1 rusted iron post the revetting wall would appear to be part of a now removed wire fence, not elsewhere recorded. It is similar to, though more substantial than, the dyke at Abhainn Gaorsaic (KIN141). If contemporary with this fence these features are probably late in the sequence here. Not being shown on the 1st or 2nd edition OS maps the fence must have been built after 1902. These features could have aided in the gathering/herding of sheep.

A turf & stone dyke nearly 1m wide and surviving up to 0.5m high sits on the S side of an unnamed burn before crossing to the N as a turf dyke to curve N to the river Croe. The N section is largely obscured by rushes & bracken. It is shown on the 1971 OS survey but not on the 1st or 2nd edition OS maps. A drystone structure with angular hearting (ie professionaly built) abuts this to form a chamber c3m by c2m . This chamber is made of coursed masonry in contrast to the large vertical boulders of the dyke. The walls of this secondary feature are only 0.3m high and c0.8m wide.

This boundary may have originally been associated with the settlement of Morvachmor which is recorded on Roy's survey of c1750. The drystone dyke part of it is more recent and may be contemporary with the sheepfold KIN154.

Site description:

There is a roofed bothy at Camban - a restored building with mortared walls c12m by c6m externally, aligned cSW/NE. Chimneys have been built into both gables. Some 20m to the ENE are the remains of a structure also with mortared walls measuring c10m by c4m over walls c0.6m wide and c0.4m high, with an entrance c0.9m wide in the SE wall. Some 10m to the E are the remains of a drystone structure c7m by c4m over walls c0.7m wide and c0.3m high. Below the path and SSE of the roofed bothy is another structure, but aligned cW/E, with mortared walls measuring c10m by c4m over walls c0.5m wide and c0.4m high, with an entrance in the S wall c!m wide. Immediately S of this are the remains of a drystone structure c8m by c5m over walls c0.7m wide and c0.15m high. Camban is noted in the 1841 census and there are 4 roofed buildings in this part of the settlement shown on the 1st edition OS map.

To the NW of these structures is an enclosure, also marked on the 1st edition OS map, defined by a dyke spread to c1m wide and c0.4m high. Another enclosure is just evident S of the path (not marked on the 1st edition OS map) with a dyke c0.8m wide and c0.2m high which has disappeared

to the S.


